Apartments

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When you think of world-class apartments, the likes of the luxury penthouses of New York, London and Paris come to mind. But Australia has its fair share of them, and more are coming. Indeed many say Australia is leading the world in this sector, as it embraces customisation and the fiftout of these six-star offerines win international praise.

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The recent marketing of the Boyd penthouse crowning the ANZ office block in Sydney's CBD offered a glimpse into a level of luxury high-rise apartment living many didn't realise existed, and garnered world-wide attention.

Property developer John Boyd and his wife Marly customised the penthouse atop the award-winning tower after selling the Castlereagh Street site to development company Groceo. Part of the dealwast hat Boyd got to keep the top three levels, then an empty shell. The penthouse is for sale through Ken Jacobs at Christie's International in conjunction with LJ Hooker agent Bill Maladle for 566 million.

The design director of architecture practice Francis-Jenes Morehen Thorp created the third present-shaped roof design that takes light drep into the apartment. Francis Jenes says he would be supprised if the apartment was ever equalled in Sydney. Boyd brought in local designer Blayney, North to create the interior of the three-level, 2400ag m apartment, a project floor years in the making, in 2017 it was ranked as the

world's finest residence in the International Design & Architecture Awards. The highest apartment in Sydney, it has a bespoke sky lounge capturing 360-degree views, with the Westfield Tower a stone's throw away. A private devator shoots up to the 43f floor. Every thing inside is custom made, including what's been described as the biggest

rug in the southern hemisphere which was hand-seen together to form one piece. "I felt there needed to be some user of connecting instell and so we developed this idea of the black ribbon," North told The Australian's With magazine. It connected the ceiling, traces the windows, turns into the bar unit, becomes the balantade of the stairceas and runs into the bedrooms, where it becomes the bedside tables. It ends on the top flow with its pool and calaxus.

North reckons the apartment even has a Batman feel. "When you drive into the basement, you come into your own private lift and ride up into your apartment above a bank, which has views all around the city," she says. "It is totally private, it's totally secure, and it's kind of like this life in the sky in the middle of the city."

Prestige apartment buyers, who demand the best inclusions, are increasingly prepared to secure one off the plan so they're able to work with the developer and designers on how they want the interiors to look. It is a significant factor as downsizers plan ahead.
