A hard-working family home is re-imagined as an elegant entertaining hub with classic Italian design credentials.

imple lines and perfect proportions, enriched by precious materials, fine finishes and elegant textiles" sums up the Armani/Casa philosophy, and it also neatly encapsulates this handsome four-bedroom home in Melbourne's south-east. The owner drew her inspiration from the furnishings house with a fashion pedigree, and the tailored result, by interior designer David Hicks, fits her like a glamorous gown.

Fortunately, she had decades to discover the perfect cut. She and her husband built the two-storey, clinker-brick home back in 1980 for their then-growing family. "We eventually had four children and our home was always a hub of activity," says the owner. During that time they renovated twice, first to extend their dining room, then to add an indoor pool and family room.

But, as empty-nesters, the couple's needs changed. "Our children all have big families, which means lots of grandchildren, and two live overseas so they often come to stay," she says. Meanwhile, her husband wanted more open living spaces that flow inside and out. "I loved our house, with its warm, elegant feel. I was reluctant to renovate, but we compromised - my husband would get his open back area and I would get three guest rooms with ensuites."

In 2019, they asked David to elevate the house from family factotum to elite entertainer. "The original build was solid »

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« and well executed," he says. "But the rear was dark. The clients wanted to connect the spaces and open up the rear and occasional bursts of intense colour," says David. informal living areas to each other and the garden. And they wanted a main bedroom suite as a retreat on the first floor."

The front section downstairs retains the original layout, with the addition of a cloak room and powder room. Meanwhile, David extended and opened up the rear, so the family room, dining room and kitchen flow seamlessly into one vast space. "As we removed major supports for the level above, we had to cantilever beams of the original structure over the rear spaces, then conceal the beams," he says. "We introduced a series of coffers which delineate the spaces without restricting flow."

The kitchen was opened up, with structural elements concealed in striking travertine blades. Meanwhile, David juggled the first floor, sacrificing one bedroom and a large family bathroom to create the desired ensuites and an enlarged main bedroom suite.

For the interiors, Armani/Casa was the sine qua non. "Throughout we referenced Armani interiors and fabrics, with

monochromatic backgrounds interspersed with striking black

The palette in the formal areas includes neutral greige polished plaster, custom Armani green silk carpet and green marble in the fireplace, which all set the scene, while a layering of Armani/Casa fabrics plays one against the other, tying the blue-green theme together. At the rear, the same background palette is infused in more black, in the marble and a dark oak dining table offset by shimmering Armani vinyl on the dining chairs and textured outdoor fabric on the family-room sofas. Upstairs in the bedrooms and bathrooms, the neutral palette is also peppered with pops of blue and green that take their cues from the formal living spaces.

Texture, celebrated in a captivating continuum from raw to smooth, takes a leading role. "We combined stucco, ribbed walnut, herringbone parquet, raw travertine, polished marble, bronze, silk, textured wallpaper, bouclé and, yes, Armani fabrics, to create a rich, layered, tactile palette," says David. "The inspiration was loosely based on great Italian design, »

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« with its structured, almost Brutalist personality. Ribbed timber and raw travertine are juxtaposed against slick marble, which hints at more excessive opulence. Refined and raw, robust and fragile, understated and dramatic, simple and ornate materials all work in synergy and in contrast to each other."

Decoration, he says, is intrinsic in the grain of the marble, the texture of the raw travertine, the ribbed oak stained in a warm walnut, and bronze trims. The living-room coffee table is custom made from blue-stained burl wood and lacquered in a piano-gloss finish. "The simple 'Parsons'-style table provides the perfect shape to showcase such an intricate yet simple material, mesmerising with its undulating lines and patterns," says David. The two custom cabinets in the living room are also a favourite. "They are a nod to Armani/Casa in their grand black piano-gloss frames and shimmering metal-beaded wallpaper inserts - the wallpaper from Armani, of course."

The owner is rapt with the finely fashioned results. "Every time we walk in the door, we appreciate the beautiful finishes and attention to detail," she says. "I loved our meetings, where David had all the samples laid out so we could work out the fabrics and finishes. But, even then, I had no idea of the minute details. The spaces all work really well. We've already hosted a few events and it's been effortless. And I could probably spend all day in our bedroom - it's like being in a six-star hotel room."

"I am proud of the whole project," adds David. "I love the outcome, with its attention to detail and the fact that I know this house from top to toe. But most satisfying of all is the happiness we have brought to the client." Is davidbicks.com






SPEED READ

» The owners had lived in this two-storey brick house in Melbourne's south-east for nearly 40 years, during which they raised four children. » In 2019, as emptynesters, they found the house no longer suited their needs. They wanted to give it a refresh by opening up the rear to create one large open plan connected to the garden. Also on the wishlist were three new ensuite bedrooms for their adult offspring and a growing army of grandchildren that regularly come to stay. » They hired interior designer David Hicks to work his magic. First up, he made structural changes, such as knocking out walls, extending the rear and reshuffling the bedrooms upstairs. » For the interior

decoration, he took his design cues from Armani/Casa, a favourite with the owner. The furnishings and fashion icon is celebrated in the neutral palettes, with pops of colour, and simple lines, using tactile and slinky gloss surfaces, expressed in timber, marble, silk and bouclé fabrics, the raw juxtaposed against the elegant and sophisticated. » The result combines the luxe of hotel style with the easy-living functionality of a family home; the formal and the informal dextrously intertwined.
